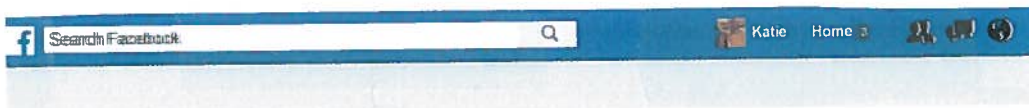

DSP SPOTLIGHT: Betsy Fels

MEET BETSY- I moved here three years ago from Los Angeles. I was a filmmaker for my whole career. When I came to Columbia County, my friend Nancy Kohler suggested that I talk to staff of Coarc's Fusion Day Hab Program (it was called the Blended Program at that time). They introduced me to Coarc's programs and I decided to become substitute staff (A big thank you to Karen Wolf for hiring me and pushing me along!). I subbed for the program for six months and then Chris Nardone, who works in Community Employment, talked me into becoming permanent staff.



I look at this as my second career. My skills as a filmmaker have come into play here at Coarc. I started the drama group with Fusion and we've conducted five plays so far (most recently, "The Trial of Alice in Wonderland"). Currently, I'm working on a documentary with the individuals who attend the Fusion program, as well as Danielle Palleschi and the "I AM: International Foundation."

Being a DSP (Direct Support Professional) is an amazing job! It is my giveback job. The individuals I work with are interesting, funny, and fun and we do lots of fun things; we learn things! We have been to the Capital to fight for funding for the wage increase; we have met amazing people; and we have gone to concerts at the Egg, among so many other things. On our outings, I get to see all sorts of places I have never seen before. My life now, living in Kinderhook, is peaceful. I live in such a beautiful place and love my drive to work every day. There is no traffic! I don't miss L.A. at all."

Bikers ride for COARC movie

GREENPORT — Two motorcycle clubs held a benefit ride Sunday afternoon to raise funds for an advocacy group to make a film about the views and lives of intellectually disabled people.

The Columbia County chapter of American Bikers Aimed Toward Education (ABATE) and the Kinderhook-based East Coast Riders made the run to get COARC closer to its \$10,000 goal to produce the film.

Betsy Fels, who moved to the area two years ago after working as a filmmaker in Los Angeles, said COARC is collaborating with Art/OMI and the I AM: International Foundation to produce the film, which she expects to run about 15 minutes.

"Our goal is to put this in (film) festivals," she said, mentioning the Woodstock film festival as a possibility.

The film would be a day in the life of an intellectually disabled person, showing their activities and showcasing their worldviews and beliefs, Fels said

"We want to show what life is really like," she said. "It's a really fantastic world we're trying to show."

The film would "show the commonalities we all share, that everyone shares," Danielle Palleschi, of COARC, said.

President of the Columbia County ABATE chapter John Boice Jr. said fundraising for COARC was a natural choice.

"Basically, we're all family," Boice said.

The run was to go down Warren Street in Hudson, through Hillsdale, and end at Claverack Town Park, where there would be a barbecue, a prize raffle, a 50/50 raffle, and games including a bike

slalom and a game where bikers would try to scoop up stuffed animals with a net as they circled around them, Boice said.

All money collected, including registration fees, money from the 50/50 and the raffle, as well as donations, would go to the production of the film.

Dodie Wheeler, president of COARC's board, said she was excited for the run and thanked the motorcycle clubs.

"These guys support the community pretty much every weekend," she said.

Wheeler said the movie would try to upend people's perceptions of those with intellectual disabilities.

"There's a perception of what [they] can and can't do," she said.

Todd Garry, a client at COARC, said he was there as a volunteer to help out the bikers.

In COARC, Garry said he participated in many community events, working with Meals on Wheels and the Columbia Land Conservancy.

"I love COARC very much, I love the staff," he said.

Garry added he recently went to a regional conference with the organization at a Marriott hotel in Albany that focused on self-advocacy and "standing up for yourself."

The ride was escorted through Hudson by the Greenport police and was to last a little more than two hours.

MELLENVILLE—Coarc applauds Amy Gregory, the proud winner of the Self-Advocacy Association of New York State (SANYS) logo contest. The contest focused on “speaking up for ourselves and others” – the major focus of self-advocacy.

In early September, Ms. Gregory attended the annual SANYS conference, along with many friends from Coarc. She is the Secretary of Coarc’s own self-advocacy group, “4 Ourselves.” Her passion is art and being in “4 Ourselves” helps her to share that.

“I want to teach individuals how to draw,” says Ms. Gregory in a press release. About being a member of the group, she

says “I get to have my drawings out there. I love meeting new people and doing activities like fundraising and getting out in the community.”

Self-Advocacy is important in the disability rights movement. According to “4 Ourselves” President Desiree Elliott, self-advocacy means helping people “so they can do things on their own, be more independent, live on their own, have jobs on their own.”

Coarc’s “4 Ourselves” helps people with disabilities to speak up for themselves and talk about important issues, such as housing and staffing to support those who experience disabilities.

I then spoke up more and I was on the verge to be able to become the first to move out of the group home to my first apartment, which I got accepted into a Coarc program called Self-Directed Services, which enables me to do what I want in my own apartment. I then got approved to move into my first apartment...I have been there for almost two years this December. In my two years living in my apartment I asked my fiancée to move in with me. Then on August 13, 2016 I got married to my love of my life Jamie. In conclusion, my life started crappy but ended up with the most amazing successful outcome. I also have an outside job at Applebee's, which I have been there for a year and a half, all thanks to my wife Jamie Hall. I also have been at Coarc for 5+ years."

"Hi, I am Jamie Hall. I started out in my own apartment through Coarc. I had staff help me with my basic needs. I have been at Coarc for 11 years and in all that time, I have grown to be the most successful woman I wanted to be. I have an outside job at Applebee's and I have been there for 2+ years and I love my job. I then got approved for a program called Self-Directed Services and I moved out of my Coarc apartment and moved in with my fiancé Russell Hall into his apartment. Then I got married on August 13th to my love of my life Russell and he became a part of my family. I have an amazing family. They have been my biggest support starting with my mom. My mom has helped me through a lot of things that happened in the course of my life. She is my most amazing person in my life. Then I also had the amazing Dad in my life. He was my best friend ever who was always there when I needed to talk. Then I have my brothers and sisters who have been the shoulder I needed to cry on or just to talk about anything. My family is my most amazing part of my life. I lost my Dad on November 29, 2015 and he was a WWII vet and I miss him very much and I just wish he was still here in person."
